It's always sad to see bowlers transfer to other clubs for what ever reasons. We will miss all the ones below.



ynthetic Bowling Greens are becoming increasingly popular due to their low maintenance and durability. In addition to this, we have found that a typical Bowling Green is taken out of action for 3 months of a year for maintenance. Most clubs will have at least 2 different bowling greens within their premises – which means up to 6 months of the year where play is not allowed.

The chart below demonstrates the lifetime cost of a regular grass surface versus a modern Synthetic Surface:

Grass vs Synthetic Bowling Green cost over 25-year lifetime As you can see the synthetic surface has a higher initial cost but has little to no ongoing maintenance costs. Around the 5 years mark the grass surface begins to actually cost more than the synthetic surface. Note: This does not include productivity lost due to maintenance periods for a grass surface.

After 15 years Synthetic Green will require resurfacing at an approximate cost of \$100k. This cost is reduced because the subsurface work has already been completed. Despite this, Synthetic Green still costs substantially less and after 25 years this difference amounts to approximately \$700k!
